A Visit from Kenyan Bishop at Central United Methodist Church

Sunday morning, May 5th promises to be a most special and memorable time.

Starting at 9:00, we will celebrate Cinco de Mayo with breakfast burritos prepared by our United Methodist Men.

THEN, during the worship service at 10:00, we will welcome <u>Bishop Isaiah Deye</u>, Presiding Bishop of the Methodist Church of Kenya, and <u>Dr. Don Messer</u>, Executive Director of the Center for Health and Hope, headquartered in Denver. Bishop Deye and Dr. Messer are coming to thank our congregation for our December gift of \$6000 to build 2 Grandmother's Houses in Kenya.

In several small villages in Kenya, the United Methodist Church is striving to build "Grandmother's Houses." Grandmothers who are extremely poor "inherit" their grandchildren when the parents die of AIDS. They and the children struggle in many ways, often living in rundown shacks. The Maua Methodist Hospital organizes and oversees the building of small homes (\$3000 each), and when completed, each new home is dedicated. Our December gifts provided the full amount needed to build two Grandmother's Houses. One will be dedicated in memory of Trae Gilbert-DeGraffe, and the other will be dedicated in honor of all the 'saints' of Central UMC.

Before being elected Bishop, Isaiah Deye was the head of the Maua Hospital that coordinates the building of the Grandmother's Houses. Dr. Messer and Bishop Deye will offer a dialogue sermon with pictures and stories about the Grandmother's House project in Kenya, and we will share in communion together.

Don't miss this unique opportunity to hear firsthand about the results of our mission-giving and to join together in welcoming our very special guests.

Native Grace

A United Methodist Ministry in Southern Colorado May Mission Focus

We are part of a remarkable story! We at Central learned about Native Grace in 2019 and have been able to support them in their ministry with several heartwarming projects.

Native Grace is a native American fellowship that holds Sunday worship in the building of the Cortez United Methodist Church. The two congregations work together to support families (especially the elderly) living on the Navajo Reservation in the Four Corners area.

In 2020 our Christmas offering raised funds to purchase replacement propane tanks for homes of the elderly. In 2021 we helped Native Grace to purchase a utility trailer so that experienced craftsmen in the church could partner with young men and women to repair rundown homes on the reservation. That service will continue for many years.

We want to continue supporting Native Grace as they offer a place where Christian faith and Native traditions come together ... a place where children can learn about their heritage as they grow to love Jesus Christ. If you're able to help, you may write a check, payable to CUMC and designated for Native Grace, or drop currency in the pottery bowl at the sanctuary doors.

Conference News from Mainstream UMC

1/3 of African Delegates May Miss General Conference

To be clear, no one at Mainstream UMC, nor in our coalition, believes there is malice involved in the absence of delegates from Africa. We have already been hearing this false accusation from the other side. We have heard, and share, concerns about widespread delays in communication coming out of the office of the Secretary of the General Conference. These concerns have now been confirmed in a press release yesterday stating that as many as 101 of 862 total delegates may not be in attendance.

The United Methodist Book of Discipline sets as a Quorum the presence of half of all delegates to conduct business. This number anticipates unusual circumstances. There are no provisions for remote participation or absentee voting. Those of us who are in Charlotte are the valid voting delegates for this 2020 General Conference. We have no alternative but to press on with the work of the church.

Here is the breakdown of Delegate allocation by region:

United States 482
Africa 278
Philippines 52
Europe 40
Concordat 10 (Britain, Mexico, Puerto Rico, and Caribbean)
Total 862

Securing visas for delegates in Africa is the hardest work of the General Conference. Every year there are between 20 and 30 delegates, mostly from Africa, who are unable to attend because of visa issues. The Secretary has now confirmed 39 absences, which might already be the highest percentage ever. But the press release shows there are 62 more still in limbo.

The information from the Secretary of the General Conference focuses on the delegates from Africa, Europe, and the Philippines, which is 370. Of the 101 who may miss, our best estimate is that 93 of those are from Africa, which would be a full third of their delegates. This is an unprecedented number that will require dramatic process changes in the future to ensure this does not happen again.

What does this mean for our work in Charlotte?

Removal of the Harmful Language: We were already confident in our vote count to remove the harmful language even if all delegates were present. There is no question that the absence of a large number of "traditional" votes will increase the percentage of removal but will not change the outcome.

Passing Regionalization: We honestly do not know the impact. We have heard there is a lot of

support for regionalization in Africa. We have also heard there is little support. As is now evident, we have not been able to contact large numbers of African delegates to find out. We need a 2/3 vote to pass regionalization. If the vote is close, either way, the delta is likely present in the missing delegates. The Secretary has also not told us from where the delegates are missing. We know there are some areas that support regionalization more than others. The missing region could be the deciding factor.

The bigger question is how this will impact ratification. If there is a significant feeling of exclusion in Africa, that could sour the willingness to ratify in the next year. The reality, however, is even those delegates who are not able to attend General Conference will still have their voice heard during the ratification vote. The harder pill to swallow would be if the vote fails at General Conference and proregionalization delegates never get to weigh in.

Ending Disaffiliations:

This, like removing the harmful language, only requires a majority vote. This is another one where the region from where Africans are missing could swing the vote one way or another. We believe if all of Africa were seated, disaffiliations would fail. This remains to be seen.

Conclusion:

We have anticipated for months that delays in sending letters of invitation to delegates could have negative consequences. This is now playing out. It is incumbent upon the remaining delegates to be thoughtful as we move forward. This is perhaps the most consequential General Conference in a generation. The show must go on.
